## The Impact of Response

Many of our students rely on financial assistance in order to pursue their dreams of a college education. Over the course of the pandemic, the needs of our students expanded to include basic necessities such as food and housing insecurities, and challenges related to the access and use of technology to continue their learning in a largely virtual environment.

We are astounded by the outpouring of generosity we've received to benefit our students through the FSCJ Student Emergency Assistance Fund and the FSCJ H.O.P.E. Food Pantry. These vital resources provide urgent relief to students, such as food, personal supplies, housing support and medical care. Numerous community partners also stepped in to provide funding to gift students with technology devices, and to stretch our technology outreach to many others by creating a successful Student Technology Lending Program.





### The Impact of Workforce

During the last year, we were especially proud of our FSCJ alumni who gave of themselves to help maintain the health, safety and well-being of our community through the course of the pandemic. ### **Programs**

FSCJ's institutional focus is on preparing our students for the vocational opportunities of today and tomorrow. Career education programs are a critical component of what we do as the community's college. We pride ourselves in being nimble and responsive providers of a well-trained, "job ready" workforce for employers in our community, and take even greater pride in what we do to enhance their economic mobility. Following is a spotlight on a very successful program, made possible by the generosity of anonymous donors. Stepping Stones was created to develop personal soft skills, and to provide accelerated career training and job placement for high school seniors graduating from low-income, high-needs schools. These students often find themselves wondering where they should go next in their journey.

#### SPOTLIGHT: STEPPING STONES

With the support of case management, advising, career development and tutoring support, students in this program are able to develop a customized pathway to success, while also earning credentials in a high-demand, specialized industry track. Stepping Stones participants receive stipends, bus passes to get back and forth to classes, computers, and other necessary supplies to enable their training and persistence. Following completion, the program continues to support participants as they progress further in their career and education.

Innovative programming such as this prove to prepare our students to be successful in careers and in life. We are humbled by the continued trust and support of the donors that make this program possible, and look forward to the student successes that will transpire in the future because of their generosity.

## The Impact of Partnerships

"If you want to go fast, go alone; if you want to go far, go together" ... This old African proverb embodies the spirit of partnership FSCJ has fostered with our donors and joint-venture partners in business and industry. This has led to the awarding of more than 150,000 degrees and professional certificates to our students, launching their careers and enhancing their skills. It is only through the financial support of our donors and strategic partnerships that we are able to continue this work and go even farther.

PARTNERSHIP SPOTLIGHT: PATHWAYS TO WORK

In partnership with Duval County Public Schools and employers throughout the community, the Pathways to Work program utilizes innovative and accelerated workforce training strategies to prepare and place high school graduates in high-demand, entry-level positions. Typically this happens with companies who join us and other donors, in co-funding the cost of training students to meet their specific workforce needs. The program is largely designed to serve students who face barriers to both academic and economic success. Other objectives include ensuring the students complete the program, graduate from high school, earn an industry

certification, are placed in jobs relevant to their training and are set on a logical pathway to continue their education toward earning a degree.

One such partnership formed in this past year was with BAE Systems. Like many manufacturing and industrial employers in the area, the company has a great demand for welders. Together we have designed a scholarship program to provide full scholarships to graduating seniors from certain Duval and Nassau county high schools who plan to enroll in the FSCJ Welding Technology Career Certificate program.



# The Impact of Scholarships

For many of our students, the cost of college looms large as the primary prohibitor to enrollment, to student persistence and to the ultimate realization of earning a degree or professional certification that launches them into the stratospheric space where their goals and aspirations lie. Many are working, raising families and managing household responsibilities while contending with their class work and cost of furthering their education. While every student's story is different, for many of them, the span over the financial gap in paying for college is "a bridge too far." We are grateful for the vision and gifts of our donors, friends and community partners who see this gap as we do – a narrow strait.

#### SPOTLIGHT: THE SONAS SCHOLARSHIP

The Sonas Scholarship was established by anonymous donors to support Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) students at FSCJ who face certain financial, personal and cultural barriers to access and graduation. The scholarship covers the full costs of attendance, thus alleviating the challenges typically faced while trying to complete the program. Upon graduation, these students go on to make an immediate impact in our community by filling vital health care roles.





#### **ENDOWMENT AND QUASI-ENDOWMENT** SPENDING ALLOCATIONS




The Foundation Investment Policy:

### The FSCJ Artist Series presents **BROADWAY IN JACKSONVILLE**

The FSCI Artist Series is a professional presenter of the performing arts operating under the auspices of the Florida State College at Jacksonville Foundation, Inc.

Since its debut in 1966, the Series has grown to become the primary source for national and international professional productions in northeast Florida and southeast Georgia.

The FSCI Artist Series presents BROADWAY IN JACKSONVILLE, sponsored by VyStar Credit Union, which brings Broadway productions, such as "The Lion King" and "Wicked," to the Times Union Center for the Performing Arts. The 2019-20 season saw lower than anticipated attendance due to the pandemic, yet still generated an estimated economic impact of \$25,428,180 to the community based on a formula used by The Broadway League.

The 2021-22 season will begin in late September of 2021 with the blockbuster "Hamilton." A full season our local economy.



## The Impact of Leadership

Dr. John Avendano began his tenure as FSCJ college president in late 2019. Equipped with a passionate dedication to the service of our students, our College and our community, President Avendano immediately became a valuable asset in garnering support for FSCJ. In October of 2020 he established the President's Circle, a donor recognition society that honors and celebrates our most generous supporters. The President's Circle is comprised of individuals, family foundations, corporations and community organizations who believe in FSCJ's mission and choose to invest in the future of our institution and our students through their financial support.

President Circle's members are recognized year-round on the FSCJ Foundation website. We also look forward to commemorating these very special donors in future Impact Reports.

Recognition levels in the President's Circle are Bronze (\$1,000 to \$4,999), Silver (\$5,000 to \$9,999), Gold (\$10,000 to \$24,999), and the Platinum level

for donors who contribute \$25,000 dollars or more annually.

Members receive regular updates regarding the College directly from President Avendano that share the impact of the donors' generosity on our institution and the students we serve. Other benefits are attributed to members that coincide with their participation level.
